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Vibrant. Impassioned. Individual.

Three words that describe our Columbia community—and also our mayor, Barbara Buffaloe, elected in 2022.

Mayor Buffaloe hails from Springfield, Illinois. She says she fell in love with Columbia on her initial visit when touring college campuses—a love that hasn't let up—only intensified.

"I just love Columbia," she says. "I mean, it's the people, it's the vibrancy. We have a lot to do here. Good places to eat, awesome festivals, the parks. The University is obviously a big name, but it's not the only name—we have a lot going for us."

She says Columbia's a very easy place to get around—whether by car, bike,

or foot. When people come here, they often contact the Mayor's office, she says, and comment that we're such a welcoming community. "They're not used to random people saying hi to them when they're walking down the street," the Mayor says. Another big CoMo plus? "There are so many unexpected treasures," Buffaloe says. "There are the normal places you go-the downtown, Mizzou games, Cosmo Park, Stephens Lake. But we have so many different neighborhood trails and neighborhood parks all within minutes from downtown or campus. I encourage people to 'get lost' when they're in town."

She explains: "Because we're such a creative, vibrant community, people have these little things in their own neighborhoods." She cites one example: "A friend of mine makes tiny houses out of clay and hides them around town. Get lost, and you're going to find some amazing things."

Buffaloe was considering attending Mizzou because she wanted to be an architect, something she realized at about age 8. Recalling a family visit to the San Francisco area and Hearst Castle, she saw a statue of Saint Barbara, the patron saint of architects. Buffaloe also

learned the architect of Hearst castle was Julia Morgan, a woman. She remembers thinking, "Well, I love playing with Legos, I love drawing, and if women can do this, well, I'll just do that."

And so she came to Mizzou. She first earned her BS in Environmental Design; an MS in Environment and Behavior followed.

Other than a brief stint in St. Louis with an architecture firm, Buffaloe has remained in Columbia.

She was a housing and environmental design specialist with the University of Missouri Extension for just over three years.

Before that, she served two years as events coordinator for the True/False Film Festival—CoMo's annual cinematic celebration of documentary films.

In 2010, she became Columbia's first sustainability director, working with a wide variety of city departments on many types of projects—a job she says piqued her interest in running for mayor.

She cites several issues she wants to impact in her mayoral role: Affordable housing, stable employment, clean drinking water, responsible recycling, and safe, reliable electricity.

This former student of architecture is now an architect of Columbia's future—a role and challenge she's eagerly taking on.



GET "ART" SIDE AND ENJOY THE VIEW

DISCOVER COLUMBIA'S CACHE OF PUBLIC ART

If you're an art lover, you're in the right place. Columbia is a highly art-centric city. You'll find Columbians share a common culture when it comes to art: We celebrate, appreciate, and create art in all forms. We support and showcase art in our galleries, on the inside and outside of our homes, in our buildings, in our parks, on our streets, hanging over our streets, in our restaurants, and more.

From the North Village Arts District (NVAD) all the way out to Stephens Lake Park—site of the Columbia Art League's annual Art in The Park event—and sprinkled throughout the blocks in between, you'll find art abounds in our town.

Public art is spread all across Columbia. Not surprisingly, you'll find much of it concentrated in The District, our downtown. Whether it's a multicolored mosaic, multicultural murals, a storied statue, mixed-media sculptures, or even a traffic box, you're likely to stumble across it. And although ambling aimlessly around CoMo is always fun, some people prefer to plan. If that's the case, plan to visit the City of Columbia's website (CoMo.gov/cultural-affairs/arts-incolumbia/public-art-gallery) and check out the maps, guides, and even an app it offers, to help you take a self-guided art tour.







With so many fun and fascinating things to explore in Columbia, it'd be easy for visitors to experience FOMO (Fear of Missing Out) in CoMo. But relax! This "can't miss" list can help you avoid FOMO and give you a good feel for the people, vibrant vibe, and history of Columbia, Missouri. While there would never be enough room to list the many amazing experiences the city can serve up, these will give you a good start. They're sure to whet your appetite for a return trip!



If you're in the mood for vino with a view, wend your way to The Blufftop A-Frame Winegarden at Les Bourgeois Vineyards in Rocheport. Perched atop a prime spot overlooking the scenic Missouri River, it's a corker of a place to relax and enjoy a glass of the winery's libations. You can also purchase shareable picnic-style bites from The A-Frame restaurant, and enjoy regular live music featuring local and regional musicians during warm weather.



Mid-Missouri rock climbers and rappellers flock to **Capen Park** for craggy climbs on its limestone bluffs. Capen's different routes, from slabby face climbs to overhanging roofs, provide a vast variety of challenges. Close to Columbia, the scenic setting along Hinkson Creek makes it a great resource for outdoor enthusiasts. At just under 32 acres, the park also features hiking trails, scenic overlooks, and bridge connections to Grindstone Nature Area and the Hinkson Creek Trail.

Stephens Lake Park is a delightful destination for all kinds of activities. It offers 116 acres of playgrounds, spraygrounds, waterfalls, a fishing lake, a swimming beach, soccer fields, picnic areas, walking trails, and of course, gardens. A true treasure, this beautiful city park features several must-sees, including the Darwin and Axie Hindman Discovery Garden, created to connect visitors with the botanical world and show how it impacts their lives.

When the first Friday of December rolls around. The District in downtown Columbia comes alive-literally!treating visitors to a merry and magical event called Living Windows. Merchants stage scenes and skits featuring live performers in their street-facing windows. These often elaborate and entertaining performances reflect each year's chosen theme. Sprinkle in some Santa sightings, candy cane giveaways, and other joys of the season, and you have an event made for memories.

Francis Quadrangle (The Quad) on Mizzou's campus and you'll spy six iconic—and Ionic—columns made with local limestone. They originally supported the first campus building, Academic Hall. After a fire in 1892, the columns are all that remain, standing as a testament to the university's heritage. At Halloween, they're often topped with pumpkins, courtesy of some intrepid campus climbers.

Stroll around

Since its debut in 2014, **Logboat Brewing Co.** has earned a boatload of loyal fans. Besides brewing amazing ales and other styles of beer, the large outdoor "shipyard" area became a popular place to quench your thirst for chillin' with friends, family, and Fido. In late 2021, the brewing bastion announced it was expanding. Among the plans: Upgrading the loading dock, elevating the grain silos, adding nearly 20,000 square feet of production space, putting an awning over the entire beer garden, as well as adding an elevated patio and container bar, building a second bar upstairs, installing an elevator, and opening a dedicated merchandise shop at the entrance. The expansion's set to open in 2023.

Retrace Columbia history with a visit to the **Columbia Cemetery** on East Broadway. It's been in use as a cemetery since 1820 and is a who's who of prominent Columbia citizens, as well as regular folks. You may recognize some of the names on the graves, as they grace local street signs and several buildings on the MU campus.

If you're looking for a magical moment, watch a stunning sunset at Cooper's Landing. Established in 1989, this combo campground/marina/store/live music venue sits on the banks of the Missouri River just off the Katy Trail. Cooper's has live music of all sorts on its stage. Grab a sammie and libation from Cooper's store or from a visiting food truck. Fun fact: Cooper's is the only boat fuel station on the Missouri River between Kansas City and St. Louis.




Originally named Mojo's, Rose Music Hall first opened in 1999. It was later rechristened in honor of Forrest Rose, a gifted local writer and musician, after his unexpected death in 2005. The live music venue keeps Rose's musical legacy alive, hosting talented artists such as Arcade Fire and The Black Keys before they both hit it big. Rose offers an indoor space with a full bar, elevated stage, pub tables and chairs, and a kitchen. Weather permitting, guests can also enjoy outdoor music in adjoining Forrest Rose Park. Rose's sister venue, The Blue Note on North Ninth Street, is a larger space in an historic theater.



How sweet it is! You can never go wrong with chocolates, right? In Columbia, when choice chocolates are what you want, head to **The Candy Factory**. This sweet-tooth-satisfying source has been in business since 1974. Known for all of its sweet treats, the business's chocolate-covered strawberries are particularly popular for Valentine's Day. Also offering a great selection of nonedible, inspirational gift items, this is one factory you'll want to clock into!

College towns and pizza places are a match made in heaven. And it's hard to match enjoying a pizza at Shakespeare's. A longtime hangout for students at the corner of Ninth and Elm Streets. "Shakes" is turning 50 this year. The prized pizza palace now has three locations in the city. And while the pies will have you droolin'--no foolin'the atmosphere really makes Shakes one-of-a-kind.

SOMETHING FOR NOTHING

Whether you're visiting Columbia for a day or you call it home, having activity options that don't break the bank can afford you more experiences for your buck. In the Columbia community, there are places to visit and unique adventures to be had for next to nothing or free.

The sights, sounds, and smells at a Columbia-area farmers' market are always free. Bring the family out to hear local entertainment while shopping with hundreds of area farmers, producers, and makers. You might even find something yummy for a snack or dinner. The **Columbia Farmers Market** on West Ash Street also gives out free kids activity kits that center on plant and food education.

Throughout the city, parks and trails offer locations for everything from picnicking and fishing at **Stephens Lake Park** to horseshoes and tennis at **Cosmo-Bethel Park** to walking and biking on one of the city's dozens of groomed or paved trails (see page 18 for a complete listing). Take a break from shopping in The District at **Flat Branch Park** on Locust Street, where you can rest a bit on the tiered seating while the kiddos splash around the spraygrounds on a hot summer day.

If you need some space to let your furry friends run with abandon, **Twin Lakes Recreation Area** is a great spot to let them off-leash. There are three leash-free dog park areas at **Twin Lakes**, one specifically for smaller dogs. There is also a playground, a fishing lake, picnic areas, and walking trails for the whole family to enjoy.

Just outside the city limits, **Rock Bridge State Park** to the south and **Finger Lakes State Park** to the north are beautiful in every season. In the summer, you can cool off at Conner's Cave at Rock Bridge or jump in a kayak at Finger Lakes.

A bit of creativity brightens up any day, and at **First Fridays** providing those kinds of sights is what the artists and businesses that host this monthly event do best. At this free event the first Friday of each month in the **North Village Arts District**, you can watch local artists at work at **Orr Street Studios**, or peruse regional, national, and international fine arts at **Sager Reeves Gallery** and enjoy creative activities, all of which are centered on imagination.

There is much to see and experience for free in Columbia when you get out and enjoy the community.





THE QUINTESSENTIAL COLLEGE TOWN EXPERIENCE

If you're coming to Columbia for a college sporting event, rest assured the experience will be everything you expect it to be in this quint-essential college town. In Columbia, University of Missouri Tigers, Columbia College Cougars, and Stephens Stars—both students and alumni—are waiting to give guests a warm welcome through time-honored traditions, great food, live music, and iconic landmarks, before, during, and after the competition.

Tradition runs deep at MU. The university is the birthplace of the homecoming tradition practiced worldwide. It began in 1911, when then-athletic director Chester Brewer invited alumni home for the football game with the University of Kansas. Attending a football game also offers visitors a chance to see the result of another tradition: Each year, incoming Tigers give the rock M on the north end zone a fresh coat of white paint. And the "M-I-Z, Z-O-U" chant echoes across fields, courts, and stadiums anytime even a few Tigers gather.

Those chants are especially prominent at the tailgates surrounding Faurot Field. The fan tailgating setups run the gamut from super simple—think a popup team-branded tent for shade, a cooler of cold brews, and carryout from a local place—to the seriously over-the-

top RV-based bash, complete with a big screen TV, elaborate Tiger trappings, Tiger tumblers, plates, and serving dishes, and bountiful buffets.

Game day eats don't get any better than a Booches burger or a slice of Shakespeare's Pizza, and across the city, local chefs, hash slingers, and foodies are coming up with culinary creations for even the pickiest of palates. Check out Beet Box, one of Columbia's newer eateries, where the chefs concoct creative concepts and new recipes daily, or Murry's where guests have been gifted with a little jazz with their meal for more than 35 years.

Speaking of music and culture, Columbia takes pride in the many venues available to experience art, both of note and canvas. The Blue Note has become a music and comedy institution, not only known locally but nationwide for finding and promoting up-and-coming acts. And in the North Village Arts District, you can find a special, one-of-a-kind souvenir to take home with you.

For any sport or any season, Columbiaarea dining, entertainment, shopping, and lodging will provide that extra "umph" you're looking for when cheering on the Tigers, Cougars, and Stars.

NEW MUSIC DIRECTOR TO HELM MISSOURI SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA

The baton has been passed. As the Columbia-based Missouri Symphony Orchestra (MOSY) approaches its 53rd year, it will be under the direction of Wilbur Lin—only the third music director in its history.

Symphony Executive Director Trent Rash acknowledges Lin is stepping into an unusual situation: "We've only had two music directors. Usually directors are with a symphony for five, six, maybe 10 years. That longevity has had its benefits, but it's also really exciting to be moving in a new direction."

Founding conductor Hugo Vianello led the orchestra from 1970 to 1998, shaping it into a highly acclaimed entity. Maestro Kirk Trevor took over the role in 2000, bringing inventive, audience-expanding programming until his retirement in 2021.

Now it's Wilbur Lin's turn. No stranger to Columbia—or MOSY—he has come full circle. Wilbur studied under Maestro Kirk in 2017 as a master class participant and during that time had his first opportunity to conduct MOSY. Now he'll have many. Although he's been conducting for a while, "This is my first music director position," he says. "I'm thrilled. I'm humbled. I'm excited."

Wilbur isn't simply excited about his new role, but about Columbia, saying it has a progressive, curious culture, with loyal residents who are interested in things and want to make things unique.

He fully believes in the possibility of balanced programming, presenting both traditional pieces and composers along with new ones. "No music survives in a vacuum," he says. "There are traditions, lineages, and influences, so we're going to program in a way that makes sense."

MOSY has already commissioned one completely new work for its 2023 season, with others to follow. For that first work, Wilbur wanted to meld the local culture of Columbia with his Taiwanese-American background and something uniquely American.



"We have someone who is drawing inspiration from Columbia, an amazing film composer in Hollywood," he explains. "She's also Taiwanese-American." He explains his choice saying, "Hollywood film music—everyone loves it. It's our music, but it's now so global that it's not just ours anymore. It's a great musical contribution by this country." He adds that Columbia will be in the work's title.

Both Wilbur and Trent agree MOSY has been doing great things—traditional concerts, Preludes at the Pubs, Holiday Pops—but they're planning other things that will allow people to see and experience music in a different way.

Two of those new experiences will take place outside the concert hall in spaces that facilitate audience interaction, much like immersive museum exhibits. Symphony-goers will have vantage points they've never had before. "To be one full story above us in balcony-like spaces," Wilbur says. Or to walk around the performing musicians on safe walkways.

The two say they're looking strategically at what the Columbia community needs and how MOSY can best serve and support it. For example, they realized

there was no crosstown honors band for high schoolers, so a new wind ensemble program was created. Another void: A high-level youth orchestra program, thus the Vianello Players will debut, named in honor of founding director Hugo Vianello and his wife Lucy. Composed of mostly high school players, participants will have the opportunity to become leaders in the youth orchestra and play with the professional symphony.

Even some of MOSY's tried and true offerings will emerge improved. Trent cites the popular "Hot Summer Nights" concert series. It's being renamed the "Firefly Music Festival." Trent explains that because the symphony has many players from outside Missouri, it's a fitting moniker: "Not everyone has the chance to catch fireflies as a child. As a native Missourian, I take it for granted. For some people, it's a magical experience they've only had as adults. When the fireflies shine and when our musicians from around the country shine and come together, it encapsulates what we're doing here: We're the Missouri Symphony a symphony for the whole state of Missouri."

Parks and Trails for Fun and Fitness

On more than 3,500 green-space acres, which include 75 outdoor parks and eight destination trails, Columbia Parks and Recreation has plenty of pride points. Improvement is a continuous process, and one 50-acre gem, Smith Park, which serves northeast Columbia, features a new .3-mile trail along its lake in addition to its skatepark, basketball court, and a new playground, among other amenities. New parking and electrical additions also amp up Stawn Park's world-class Harmony Bends Disc Golf Course, but beyond its dedicated disc course, this 129-acre park is rich with natural features like woodlands and Harmony and Perche Creeks.

If walking, hiking, and bicycling are what you seek, Columbia has an extensive trail system built with this in mind. The nearly 65-mile Columbia Trail System is a partnership—a combination of city-owned trails, MU-owned trails, and Boone County trails. In the mix are some dynamic, well-known trails like the MKT Nature and Fitness Trail, an 8.9-mile historic railroad spur-turned-fitness trail that connects to the larger Katy Trail State Park that traverses the state. Smaller trails thread the community and get you from point A to point B around Columbia without ever setting foot or bike tire on a road used by automobiles. These smaller trails are a part of a larger plan that will connect them to form a 30-mile loop encircling the city. To date, half of the distance has been completed, with the Rollins Street Connector being the most recent addition to the planned loop of trails.



New Parks With Perks Planned

Just like its activity-loving citizens, Columbia is not content to rest on its laurels when it comes to providing parks. Two exciting new additions are in the works, slated to open in 2024.

The largest-ever land donation for a Columbia park won city council approval in early 2023. Donated by Carol Ann Alspaugh, wife of the late John W. Alspaugh, the 201-acre **John W. Alspaugh Park** will span property on both the north and south sides of Mexico Gravel Road and the west side of Vandiver Drive. The new park will serve as the trailhead for the northern section of the Hinkson Creek Trail, and

the city agreed to maintain the property as a green space and wildlife habitat. The city plans to develop nature trails in the area, and no cars or bicycles will be allowed past designated parking spaces.

But bicycles will be warmly welcomed at a **new bike park** in Cosmo Park. The project will be built near the 4.1-mile Rhett's Run mountain biking trail, and will include a trailhead, an asphalt pump track, a mountain bike skills course, a bike playground, and more.

The bike playground will help bikers of all ages and abilities to learn to ride a bike and develop their skills, and the city plans to ensure that both the pump track and cyclo-cross event space meet the high standards required to host professional competitions.

IN SHARP CONTRAST

EXPLORE COLUMBIA'S AFRICAN-AMERICAN HERITAGE TRAIL

Like many fledging communities founded before the end of the Civil War, Columbia endured its share of growing pains. Founded in 1821 (three years after the original town, called Smithton, was founded then moved for water access reasons and renamed Columbia), the town was largely segregated at the war's end in 1865. Blacks were not allowed to shop in white-owned stores, attend white schools and churches, or secure the services of most white professionals such as doctors and lawyers. Out of both necessity and desire, blacks began to create "The Other Columbia," an area where they could freely work, shop, and socialize. Black-owned businesses sprang up and institutions that welcomed blacks were opened.

The property at the center of The Other Columbia was owned by two black men, Gilbert Akers and John Lang. Theirs was an undesirable location, in the floodplain where Flat Branch Creek was used as an open sewer. The roads were unpaved, and access to plumbing was scarce. But it was the only option for freed slaves looking to call Columbia home.

Largely self-contained and separate from the rest of the city, The Other Columbia covered about 30 square blocks on the north side of Broadway in central Columbia and stretched from Fifth to Sixth Streets on both sides of Walnut Street. Christened "Sharp End," it became a thriving business center with black-owned businesses such as restaurants, meeting halls, barber shops, bars, and more. At its peak, the Sharp End served as the black community's cultural nucleus, and included churches, schools, homes, and social clubs. One theory about Sharp End's name speculates that it was because residents were expected to "look sharp."

Sharp End was a place where black adults could work, dine, and socialize. Children were not allowed in the area without parental supervision. Once a young person reached 18, they could enter; it was something of a rite of passage.

In 1954, Columbia began a methodical process to dismantle Sharp End, citing the federal urban renewal program. (The Supreme Court struck down school segregation the same year, but it would be a decade before the Civil Rights Act was passed.) Local government decided Sharp End needed to be revitalized and declared the area "substandard." Sharp End was razed and new construction began. Many black homeowners and businesses from the area couldn't recover economically. Former residents were forced to rent homes, and many black-owned businesses never reopened.



In her ethnography, Successful Black Entrepreneurs in Columbia, Missouri, Alisa McDonald-Warren described what happened: "The federal Urban Renewal Program allowed property where black businesses were located to be condemned as 'slums' and then bought by white business owners and 'redeveloped."

Columbia's African American Heritage Trail was created to honor significant local black people and institutions from the city's first 200 years. A two-mile trail in the heart of Columbia, The African American Heritage Trail, includes 23 informative markers, such as the one describing the "Blind" Boone Home.

The goal of the trail project was to preserve this important piece of Columbia history and ensure that people, in particular today's young black Columbians, are aware of it.

The idea for the trail was first conceived by Columbian James Whitt, chairman of the nonprofit Sharp End Heritage Committee, and his friend and former Sunday school teacher, Deacon Larry Monroe, in 2015. Working in collaboration with Columbia Parks and Recreation, and with financial support from several local businesses and individuals, they turned the trail dream into a reality.

Among the markers that remember and reveal the Sharp End story are those that honor entrepreneur Annie Fisher, and Clara Miles and the Miles Manor subdivision.

Visitors can tour this historic area on foot. The tour includes stops at the few remaining Sharp End brick-and-mortar buildings: the Second Missionary Baptist Church, Douglass High School, and the Tibbs' building.

More important than the obvious brick-and-mortar reminders of Sharp End are the intangible ones—the memories, stories, and photos shared by residents of that time. Plan to explore the African-American Heritage Trail. You'll come away with a new understanding of Columbia's past.

A year after the Berlin Wall came down, Churchill's granddaughter secured eight sections of the wall for a sculpture she named "Breakthrough." It is the largest remaining segment of the Berlin Wall outside of Berlin.





FROM POP-UP TO POPULAR, BAGEL SHOP BEARS VISITING

Amanda Rainey has been interested in making bagels since 2014, when she went on a weeklong food trip to New York City with other lewish professionals in the culinary world.

She always enjoyed baking challah every Jewish New Year with her family, and then every week when she worked at Hillel on MU's campus. After becoming a mom, she baked challah at home for Shabbat on Fridays. "I made bagels for the first time a few weeks after COVID lockdown when I needed a project," Rainey says.

When she and her husband, John, opened Pizza Tree in 2014, she had a vision that one day they'd make bagels using the same equipment as the pizza dough. Fast forward six years: Rainey started Goldie's Bagels as a weekly pop-up at Pizza Tree in 2020.

Goldie's bagel recipe was adapted from Pizza Tree's dough recipe, using their original sourdough starter, and was inspired by the old tradition of New York-style bagel baking. But Rainey says she was much more inspired by the local bagel shop, the corner bakery, and the Jewish deli that she grew up going to in St. Louis. "We make tzitzel bagels—that is a St. Louis Jewish bakery special—and we also love to bread-slice bagels!"

Pastry chef Jill Rostine provided pastry recipes that she had adapted, some from her previous business, Good Food Co., and others from Jewish cookbooks the pair found. Some came from their family recipes, "and from baking (and eating) a lot of pastries!" Rainey says.

The shop moved into its space on Ninth Street at the end of 2021 and has catered close to 10 Bar/Bat Mitzvahs since opening. They've made bagels for Jewish baby namings and wedding brunches, as well. Its slogan, "Made By Moms For Your Mornings, Meetings, and Mazel Tovs!" couldn't be more fitting. "It's very special to me to be able to help keep our tradition alive here in mid-Missouri and to help people celebrate these events that are



so important to people's lives," Rainey says. "Part of the inspiration for Goldie's was to provide bagels and other traditional Jewish foods for my Jewish community here and the wider community as well." She says they also feel lucky to be able to contribute to the vibrant diversity of downtown Columbia.

If you're wondering about the shop's name, it was the second choice of names for Rainey's first-born daughter. "We realized when we were opening the pop-up that it would be a perfect name for a bagel shop in Columbia because it sounded old and Jewish, and also because Mizzou's colors are black and gold! So we make a black and gold bagel using turmeric and black sesame seeds and call it the goldie," Rainey says.

Rostine made savory rugelach for the annual True/False Film Fest in March, and the shop's new bagel baker is perfecting its pumpernickel bagel recipe and also bialys.

Customer compliments never get old, and one in particular makes Rainey's day: "When a New Yorker tells us these are the best bagels they've ever had," she says with a smile.

The pair's picks for their personal favorites? Rainey prefers pastrami, egg, and cheese on poppy seed, while Rostine relishes bread-sliced tzitzel with scallion cream cheese, zhug, and avocado.

THE WHOLE BISCUIT AND CABOODLE



It was in the late summer of 2013 when chef Bryan Maness got his biscuit business rolling ... literally. Maness purchased a food truck and had it emblazoned with his Ozark Mountain Biscuit Co. logo. The round logo, with its distinctive dough-crimped edge, sits atop a sunrise scene as warm and golden as the bake on the biscuits Maness made from scratch each morning. His truck debuted at Pridefest, held in Flat Branch Park at that time.

Serving up country classics plus new, inventive items atop freshly baked biscuits, Maness's menu celebrated Southern home cooking and reflected his family's northeast Arkansas roots.

Take the truck's hearty offering, The Boss Hog, which is an open-faced biscuit topped with greens, pulled pork, gravy, Arkan-Sauce—a house-made tangy barbecue sauce—and crispy fried onions. Yum! More into tried-and-true breakfast basics? Try the biscuits and gravy or the bacon or sausage, egg, and cheese biscuit. Ozark Biscuit Co.'s sunnyland sides include kale slaw, simmered greens, and Southern home fries.

The biscuit truck soon became a sought-after source of flavorful, grab-andgo fare in Columbia, where it frequented festivals, The Columbia Farmers' Market, Logboat Brewing Co., and other locations around town.

The biscuit truck has logged a lot of miles since then, and Maness reached



another milestone in 2021—opening a brick-and-mortar eatery, Ozark Mountain Biscuit & Bar, at 1204 Hinkson.

A physical location offered many attractive benefits for Maness and Ozark Mountain's many fans. It meant Maness could offer an expanded version of his proven menu, a full-service indoor dining room, full bar, a grab-and-go espresso bar, plus an outdoor patio where patrons could relax. With a location across the street from hoppin' hops producer Logboat Brewing Co., which doesn't serve food, the new Biscuit & Bar also held the promise of patrons hungry for a bite after imbibing a brew.

The new brick-and-mortar eatery serves breakfast, brunch until 4 PM, lunch, and dinner. It also allows Maness to offer customers another taste-tempting treat: The Sunday Supper Club. From 4 to 9 PM every Sunday, you can enjoy an eight-piece, brined and deep-fried whole chicken dinner with all-you-can-eat garlic butter biscuits, mashed potatoes, gravy, and green beans.

Just as with his biscuit truck, Maness insists on fresh, high-quality, seasonal and local ingredients at his Hinkson restaurant. When unable to grow these ingredients himself, he finds other local partners to help. Patchwork Family Farms, Maries River Wagyu, Luebbering Shorthorns, and Stanton Brothers are among those Maness leans on.

No worries if you're gluten sensitive; you can replace the biscuits with gluten-free cornbread. Vegetarian options are available, too, along with daily specials.

Ozark Biscuit Co. also offers catering and boxed-meal delivery for local businesses and events and its frozen biscuits are also sold at local grocery stores in CoMo.

So while you're in town, why not risk it and try Biscuit? You can visit the restaurant or track the truck on Facebook.

ELEVATED EATING

YOU'LL "FARE" WELL AT THIS SOPHISTICATED DESTINATION

Flyover is one restaurant you definitely want on your radar when you're in Columbia. This intimate, fine-dining spot serves seasonal small-plates with elan, in a comfortable communal setting.

Flyover's name is a tongue-in-cheek nod to the fact that Missouri is in the middle of the country, between the two coasts, both viewed as "cuisine capitals." Missouri is in "flyover" country, easily dismissed as a state with a basic meat-and-potatoes palate and a fondness for fried food.

But the co-owners of Flyover beg to differ. Adam Wells-Morgan and Dan Dethrow are Columbia natives and these two sons of the Show-Me State can't wait to show you how wrong that perception is.

From the minute you arrive and see the cords of stacked firewood flanking the front door, you can sense you're in for something special. Wood-fired fare is one of Flyover's signatures, along with a menu of always-evolving shareable small plates created with fresh, seasonal ingredients from local farms.

When you enter the eatery, you'll immediately notice the wood-burning oven and open-concept kitchen/bar, with stools lining the bar's perimeter. Church pew-style benches span several tables,

and other free-standing tables with chairs complete the collective aesthetic. Wells-Morgan and Dethrow wanted their space to convey a sense of community, of coming together to break bread and socialize.

Both share a deep appreciation for the way food can bring people together. Chef Wells-Morgan helped his grandmother prepare family dinners in her kitchen, setting the stage for him to pursue a culinary career. He worked at two highly regarded restaurants here before moving to New York in 2001 to attend the Culinary Institute of America. After internships with acclaimed eateries in New York and Kansas City, he moved back to Columbia in 2003, where he worked at multiple well-regarded restaurants.

Dethrow, a long-time friend of Wells-Morgan, grew up in the restaurant industry—his dad owned Columbia classic Booches from 1976-2005—and Dethrow worked there until graduating college. He also honed his craft at Village Wine & Cheese and Tellers in Columbia.

Since then, he has lived and worked in England, New Orleans, Indiana, and Michigan, amplifying his bar and restaurant expertise. As Flyover's beverage director, Dethrow wants guests to enjoy

sophisticated cocktails served by a friendly, knowledgeable staff, and to give his bartenders space—and license—to constantly innovate and elevate their craft.

Wells-Morgan and Dethrow conceived the concept for Flyover during the summer of 2014. In 2016, it became a reality.

Today, Flyover's inventive food and beverage creations don't disappoint. One excellent example: The "Chicken Fried" Cauliflower. This playfully named dish is actually vegetarian. It melds the flavors of crisp fried cauliflower, smoked sweet potato puree, Crows Fork Farm fresh goat cheese, chimichurri, and sliced green onion.

Another stand out? The soft pretzels, which are wood-fired Companion Bakery pretzel bread, served with warm Boursin fondue topped with walnuts, dried cranberries, and thyme-infused honey.

And speaking of infused, Flyover's cocktail menu often includes housemade shrubs infused with creative combinations of ingredients, along with a variety of local draft brews, as well as Rieger's Kansas City whiskey.



With a grandmother whose family emigrated from Sicily, it's no surprise Michelle "Shelly" La Fata knows her way around Italian dough—both pasta and pastry. She's a true doyenne of dough.

Her grandmother Josephine grew up in an Italian neighborhood in St. Louis, and La Fata lovingly honors Grandma Josie and her Italian heritage by baking cookies using Josie's recipes. La Fata also makes a variety of pastas and sauces based on classic Italian cooking but using her own original recipes.

All La Fata's items, including her toasted raviolis, are both handmade and scratch-made. She uses local, in-season ingredients in all her pastas, along with imported Italian items when needed. Her pastas, meatballs, lasagnas, and soups are all frozen and ready to heat.

Before 2022, you could only find La Fata's foods at the Columbia Farmers' Market, or by ordering online at PastaLaFata.net for pickup or delivery. But now there's another option: a visit to her brick-and-mortar shop at 1207 Rogers St., Suite 106. The location isn't exactly a restaurant—something she may open in the future— but rather a grab-and-go shop where you can pick up fresh, ready-to-eat specials from one case, and indulge in Italian pastries and sweets from another. Pasta La Fata also offers sauces and meals to take home, as well as ingredients integral to a great Italian meal.

"Pasta La Fata is the only place in Columbia you can find high-quality authentic Italian pasta dishes and groceries. The warm and friendly staff make it even better," says patron Liz Tummons-Galzetti. Her husband, Italian native Fabio Galzetti, agrees: "L'unico posto dove puoi mangiare una buona pastasciutta a Columbia." ("The only place you can eat good pasta in Columbia.")

And speaking of Italian meals, La Fata also offers the Pasta La Fata "Scrappy Meals" program, started during the pandemic. The program turns her scraps into free meals for anyone who needs one.

Shelly La Fata isn't just a good cook; she's also a good Samaritan.

That's a big part of why Johnson generously gave away meals during the worst of the COVID pandemic.

The spot's known for its homey atmosphere and homestyle favorites such as skillets, biscuits and gravy, pies, and other delicious, filling fare. Johnson says he's met so many interesting people over the years who've come in to dine while here for sporting events, college visits, and even doctors' appointments.

Originally, the diner was called The Minute In. Johnson says he laughed at that play on words. Depending on how you pronounced it, it could mean a minute in time, or a really small—i.e. minute—diner. Small in size, certainly, but not in popularity.

Named for her hometown of Sagua La Grande, Cuba, owner and head chef Katy Ugalde grew up in the family's restaurant business. It's no surprise she learned the secrets and skills behind authentic Cuban cooking.

After heading to Dallas in 1997 and working in a high-end restaurant, she was hungry for a fresh start. With both her chef and English skills sharpened, Ugalde came to Columbia. She worked at several local places including the Country Club of Missouri and Flat Branch Brewing Co., before opening Sagua La Grande in 2019, realizing her dream of having a Cuban cafe serving authentic flavors from her town.

Today, we're reaping the rewards of Ulgalde's efforts. You can enjoy flavorful Cuban classics, like Ropa Vieja (Ugalde's favorite dish on the menu and a best-seller), a Cubano sandwich, arroz con pollo (two more best sellers), empanadas, traditional picadillo (General Manager Greg Butler's favorite dish), and more.

In addition to his role as GM, Butler makes some of the desserts and dessert specials, along with sandwiches, salads, and entrees. Among the most popular desserts are flan and guava cheesecake.

Greg says they get a lot of newcomers to Cuban cuisine, and that a lot of people share desserts, or come in just for dessert and Cuban coffee. "We want everyone to know that this is as authentic as it gets; this is a similar menu to what you will find (with a few exceptions) all across Cuba," he says.

This is your cue to try Cuban, if you never have.





"If you enjoy local, if you enjoy quaint, we're your spot," says Dive Bar's co-owner Karen Geotz. Contrary to its name, the spot is hardly a "dive bar" in the traditional sense. With creative menu items such as the portobello-stuffed avocados, courtesy of Lee Roberts, and the Dive Cristo, the food has a fun, flavorful flair. It was the first spot in CoMo to offer candied peppered bacon, another of Roberts's culinary contributions.

Popular picks include lobster rolls and the Berkshire (Rueben). A wide whiskey selection, spacious patio, and live music on the weekends are other pluses.

Although Nichols was not professionally trained, his life experiences easily translated into tasty creations. With grandparents who were hog farmers, he grew up learning to butcher and prep meat. Along with assists from Roberts and J.T. Schnakenburg, who was with the kitchen team early on, the restaurant's menu took shape.

Dive Bar has some exciting new menu items coming this year, and began offering bowls this past spring. Goetz says they may even add flatbreads and some official "big" entree items daily.

So when in CoMo, dive into Dive Bar's deliciousness. It won't disappoint.

The three flavor-makers at this quirky and inventive ice cream shop each get their creative sparks for Sparky's from different sources: Sami thinks up silly puns and then builds flavors around them. She says it makes her so happy when customers recognize the references—especially when they enjoy the ice cream, too.

Ryan says, "Honestly, inspiration can come from anywhere. I've dreamed stuff up. There's also a suggestion jar!"

Tony, the veteran maker with 15 years at the shop, loves going into grocery stores or global markets, walking around, and looking at ingredients he thinks could be interesting. "I also like researching what flavors of ice cream are popular in different parts of the world. Whenever I travel, I always get ice cream at as many places as I can," Tony says. "I should probably start writing those off as a business expense."

Providing a frozen fix for customers since 2003, Sparky's is known for its luscious, lickable creations, whimsical decor, and sometimes daring dairy delights; it once served a cicada flavor. Ryan says, "The cream cheese rangoon was the most controversial flavor I've made. I swear some people really liked it!" Adds Sami, "I made a spicy pickle flavor for the 4th of July last summer and it tasted exactly like it was meant to."

Sparky's always has 26 flavors available: 22 ice creams and four non-dairy/vegan options. They've made a concerted effort the last few years to have more vegan and non-dairy options. Although the shop served a flavor for Homecoming in 2022, "we don't normally get into the sports realm," Tony says. "We love doing holiday flavors and coming up with good scary movie puns for Halloween."

The makers love partnering with other places in town. They've worked with Ozark Mountain Biscuit Co., Boone Olive Oil Co., Lakota Coffee, BeetBox, and others. Soon, Sparky's will be collaborating with Les Bourgeois Vineyards, offering two flavors: White Russian and Les Bourgeois. Of the "regular" flavors, Oreo Speedwagon is the runaway favorite.

There are food trucks and then there's Billy Hinson's Old School BBQ food ... bus. Yes, an actual old yellow school bus that was converted to a fully functional smokin' and servin' station.

When Hinson originally started selling his barbecue in 2017, he had a flatbed trailer that he hauled his smokers, steamers, warmers, and generator around on. He'd then work and sell out of a tent.

After a few years of that, he decided there had to be a better way, but properly-outfitted food trucks can be expensive. After sharing his dilemma with a pal, Hinson's buddy suggested a school bus as a solution.

Hinson had the bus totally modified so he could smoke his meat on-site. He then changed the name of his business from "Pork Belly and Burnt Ends" to its current moniker, "Billy Hinson's Old School BBQ," tying his whole concept up with a neat yellow bow. He rolled the bus out in summer of 2020.

Luckily, the food didn't change when the name did. Hinson still fuels his smokers with oak and hickory wood and charcoal, never propane. Eager diners can even watch smoking in action. His best-selling menu items are the brisket or burnt ends—cut to order—along with his brisket sandwich. He also serves up ribs, pulled pork, and slow-cooked chicken glazed with his signature sauce. Side choices are baked beans, mac 'n' cheese, coleslaw, or potato salad.

You're bound to find that perfect present or something that "speaks to you" for yourself.







THE SWEET SMELL OF SUCCESS

For something uniquely personal, visit Makes Scents at 25 S. Ninth St. Are there certain smells that make you smile? Makes Scents can meld them into a signature scent just for you! The staff can concoct a custom-made scent to suit you or someone you care about. The shop also carries handmade soaps and a variety of other aromatic items, as well as other giftable items.

A GATHERING OF GIFTS AND GOODS

Columbia is also home to Plume, a unique shop and communal gathering place for customers and female craft creators to convene. Located at 575 I S. Route K in Columbia, Plume sells handcrafted items, including wearable, edible, and usable ones. But perhaps more importantly, it offers various workshops and private events and a supportive atmosphere. Owner Kelly Gilleon says, "At the end of the day, I hope Plume isn't just a shop full of pretty things. I hope it's known as a place filled with a pretty spirit. A place that welcomes women ... young and old. Maybe to shop. Maybe to talk. Maybe to gather and learn a new craft or support one another through life's trials."





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PAGING ALL BOOK LOVERS

COLUMBIA HAS YOU COVERED

Columbia is a community of readers. If you're a bibliophile, you'll want to book it to one of CoMo's best bets for browsing and buying.

Since 1977, Columbia Books, 1907 Gordon Street, has filled the wishes of avid readers and collectors nearby and from a distance. This shop has an eclectic mix of 35,000 cataloged books on its shelves, from the latest releases to antique volumes. A step ahead of giant online booksellers, the store began selling books online in 1992. These story sleuths will even search for editions they don't have for customers. The shop also carries a big collection of prints, maps, and older periodicals. Keep an eye out for the shop's two resident felines, aptly named after characters from Harry Potter—Draco and Andromeda. You may catch them catnapping somewhere.

In the heart of The District, on Ninth Street, you'll find a book bonanza: Not just one bookstore, but two! **Yellow Dog Books**, 8 S. Ninth, is a mom-and-pop shop that buys, trades, and sells fiction, nonfiction, and children's books "in the hope that everyone can find a little something to treasure." An artsy aside? Kelsey Hammond, co-owner of the shop with her husband Joe, is the executive director of the Columbia Art League (CAL) at 207 S. Ninth. (Worth a side trip.)





A few doors away is **Skylark Bookshop**, 22 S. Ninth. Opened by accomplished author Alex George, who has penned seven novels including *The Good American*, Setting Free the Kites, and The Paris Hours, the shop offers a carefully curated selection of books of every ilk, including self-published books by residents of mid-Missouri.

Many of Skylark's staff are writers themselves. The shop offers subscriptions and a reading spa, and customers may also order online. Check out Skylark's quirky collection of book-related wares, such as mugs, spices, T-shirts, and more. Epilogue: George is the founder and director of

Columbia's annual Unbound Book Festival, which occurs every April.

Columbia is also home to a **Barnes & Noble Bookseller**, located at the Columbia Mall, 2300 Bernadette Drive.

Although not technically a bookstore, the **State Historical Society of Missouri** (SHSMO), 605 Elm Street, has an excellent bookstore featuring many Columbia- and Missouri-related titles.

And if you happen to be in town at the right time, Columbia's Daniel Boone Regional Library, 100 W. Broadway, becomes a de facto book store several times a year in a fundraising effort.

CHECK OUT COMO'S GAMING & TRADING CARD SPOTS

If you and your friends or family are into board or card games, or role play, you'll find Columbia's game, too!

CoMo has a warm and welcoming game community. **Valhalla's Gate Games**, near the Columbia Mall, was opened in 2000 by
Mark and Katie Burton, and two other business partners, Thad and
Suzanne Yonke. At the time, there were a couple of other game
stores in Columbia, but neither store is still in business.

Valhalla's Gate stocks an impressive array of family and board games, strategy, party, and collectible card games, miniatures, singles for Magic the Gathering, Dragon Shields, card sleeves, deck boxes, and more. It has a large, dedicated gaming space and hosts tournaments, campaigns, leagues, workshops, and special events.

Magelings Games on Providence Road was founded in 2012 by Sheldon Jackson, and Nathaniel "Nat" Graham and wife, Tracy. Nat says, "We focused more on collectible card games and offering open spaces to play, while keeping our sales floor reduced."

Nat had a store called Magelings in Nova Scotia, Canada, when he was in the Canadian Navy. When he and Tracy moved to Columbia, he missed having a good Magic community. The couple happened to live near the original Valahalla's Gate location in south Columbia, which didn't have a Magic community. "Nathaniel partnered with them on consignment to sell items through their store," Tracy says. Eventually the couple opened a store of their own.

Their goal at the time was to work at the shop without pay and make enough to cover rent and refresh products. "From week one, we had such an outpouring of support that we made enough money to pay the rent and have been growing ever since," Tracy says. "We knew we could add products and other gaming communities if we made the space welcoming and family-friendly. One by one, we focused on the players and their needs to build community."

Magelings was the first Columbia store to hold weekly Yu-Gi-Oh and Pokemon events/tournaments. "We hold weekly events as well as 'sneak peeks' or prereleases for these systems and others," Nat says. Like Valhalla's Gate, the store has a board game library and miniature tables, and has hosted large competitive events for Magic the Gathering.

Nat is proud of the diversity within their store. "Just the other weekend I was seeing children playing Pokemon with adults. In another part of the store there were mixed age adults enjoying the latest release of Magic the Gathering," he says. "We have a pretty broad spectrum of ages, backgrounds, and lifestyles."

They've had people come from Texas for their events. "During the summer, we see a lot of travelers due to our closeness to the highway. Being a college town, there are always visitors to our city."

In addition, although not officially a game and card shop, **Slackers** on **Broadway** carries Magic the Gathering and Pokeman cards.

EXPLORE THE NORTH VILLAGE ARTS DISTRICT

Columbia is home to a creative, artistic population and the North Village Arts District (NVAD) showcases their talents, as well as those of other mid-Missouri artists and craftspeople, in a spectacular fashion.

As its name implies, it is a "village" of sorts—a close community of supportive, creative souls who work and create in renovated and repurposed buildings, warehouses, and shops. Art, music, and small businesses thrive in this unique part of CoMo. NVAD was founded in 2009 and is a 501c3 nonprofit organization.

NVAD, a roughly nine-block-square area one block north of Broadway (Columbia's main drag), is the ideal place for an artfilled outing, whether you're looking for a special souvenir, a gift, or a piece of art to acquire—hands down you'll leave with your find in hand.

Stroll along East Walnut Street and find several great galleries to browse. The Sager Reeves Gallery offers eclectic exhibitions including paintings, photography, and sculpture. Artlandish is an intriguing little gallery

offering options for gifts, fine art, apparel, and home decor.

Another place to check out is **Orr Street Studios**. Something of an artists collective. it facilitates interactions between the public, art, and artists. This NVAD linchpin features revolving exhibits in its gallery, hosts artrelated private and community events, and houses more than 30 artists.

You'll find more than 150 artists total in NVAD working out of fine arts studios, film companies, dance studios, design companies, music studios, live performance spaces, galleries, nightclubs, a theater, restaurants, cafes, shops, yoga studios, a distillery, and a farmers and artisans market.

NVAD is also known as the home of First Fridays—a free art crawl on the first Friday of each month. On First Fridays, visitors can stroll through the area from 6 to 9 PM and browse galleries, shops, and businesses, while also enjoying music, art demonstrations, children's activities, refreshments, and much more.

Plan an art-filled excursion to NVAD. It's inviting, inspiring, and incomparable.

COURSE CORRECTOR

ADONICA COLEMAN PUSHES FOR POSITIVE CHANGE

Our city isn't the only Columbia that Adonica Coleman has called home. She and her husband, Demarko, lived in Columbia, Maryland, prior to moving here in 2007. The couple was raised in St. Louis, so when Demarko's company offered him a position here, they jumped at the chance to move their girls closer to family. And are we ever grateful our Columbia won out.

"My favorite part of living here is the sense of community, and it's a great place to raise a family," Coleman says.

She has enriched that sense of community immeasurably. She is a volunteer and serves on the boards of Granny's House, a multichurch effort that provides a place for youth who reside in public housing to gather, learn, and play; The BOLD Academy (Black + Brown Opportunity, Leadership & Development), which works to empower and uplift Black and Brown Girls through enrichment opportunities, leadership training, education, and positive identity; the Columbia Chamber of Commerce; and REDI (Regional Economic Development Inc.).

She was also an adjunct professor at Stephens College in the Events and Convention Management program. "That was another experience that I cherish," she says.

She's been a part-time coach at Missouri Women's Business Center (MoWBC), which provides resources, support, and networks for women seeking to grow or start their own businesses. As the owner of A2D events, "I was excited that I had knowledge to share and an outlet to share it," she says.

Coleman says she could count on her hands the number of female-minority-owned businesses she was aware of when she first came to town. As she got out more into the community, "I would run across a few but no huge numbers. Most during that time seemed to be hair salons and food services," she says. "Now I see so many more businesses owned by Black women in other arenas. It is great to see the growth even though we still have a ways to go. I will continue to do what I can to be a part of that change."

Her newest venture, The COMO 411, is a culmination of all her experiences in Columbia over the past six years. "We will do that through a new digital talk show that I host that launched in March, a website with a comprehensive community calendar, and extensive social media campaigns."

How does this wife and mom of four daughters find time for it all? "I only commit to things that fit into my circle of influence and concern. I feel like my voice in those spaces is necessary to the future of this community and how it is shaped," Coleman says. "I have daughters here and want to contribute as much as I can to this place that one or more of them might end up calling home."
